Context Setting

Brief overview of wildfire in California



Wildfire in California

Life in California has relied on wildfire since time immemorial.

Vegetation started to build up, creating fuel for future wildfires. Planners must address wildfire & climate change in their general plans.



The State of California passed a series of laws to suppress wildfire.

Climate change begins to exacerbate wildfire hazards in California.



The Wildland-Urban Interface

Nearly 1/3 of the homes in California are built within or adjacent to wildland areas.



Wildfire risk can be reduced through land use planning and implementation.




Community-scale action can protect climate vulnerable communities.

"...assist local governments in developing effective fire hazard policies and programs in the general plan..."

Action 2.5 – Develop a WUI Best Practices Inventory

"The inventory will serve as a complement to OPR's Fire Hazard Planning Technical Advisory and will inform local governments on how best to develop and implement plans, codes, standards, and enforcement activities within the WUI..."



A supplement to OPR's General Plan Guidelines



General Plan Guidelines

General plans are blueprints for meeting communities' long-term visions for the future.



Wildfire Requirements

SB 1241 (2012) amended GC § 65302 (g)(3):



Wildfire must be addressed in the general plan safety element for jurisdictions in the State Responsibility Area (SRA) and Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones (VHFHSZs) upon the next housing element update on or after 1/1/2014.

In 2015, OPR developed a Fire Hazard Planning TA to address these requirements.




Purpose

Update the 2015 TA to include:

"specific land use strategies to reduce fire risk to buildings, infrastructure, and communities" per GC § 65040.21

Provide guidance to help agencies:

- Conduct outreach
- Assess wildfire hazards & risks
- Align general plan activities
- Develop policies & programs





Technical Advisory Process



OPR conducted research, interviewed experts, and convened a State agency working group.



OPR released a draft TA for public comment, hosted a webinar, and conducted several briefings.



OPR revised the TA in response to the comments received and made additional minor edits.




OPR released the final TA to the public on August 17th and will provide ongoing support.

Note: Per GC § 65040.21, OPR must update the guidance document "not less than once every eight years".



Components





Key Concepts



Community Engagement

- Engage early and often
- Reduce the duplication of efforts



Hazard Identification

- Review the latest wildfire data
- Consider post-fire hazards



Risk Assessment

Consider alignment with environmental justice and climate vulnerability efforts



Cost and Benefit Analysis

- Use a holistic planning approach
- Consider secondary impacts



Land Use Alternatives Analysis

- Start upstream in the process
- Protect from unreasonable risks



Policy Development

- Create alignment across elements
- · Plan alignment is also encouraged



Public Comment Themes



Land Use Alternatives

Commenters felt that the draft
TA set a preference for
avoidance over riskminimization activities and
expressed that this could
create barriers for housing
development.



Policy Development

Commenters felt that the TA should address regulatory challenges such as increased housing pressures from RHNA, permitting ADUs, streamlining entitlement approvals, and scaling up vegetation management activities.



Hazard Identification

Commenters wanted the TA to address additional hazards such as wildfire smoke and post-fire landslides & flooding.

OPR received a total of 33 public comments.



Notable Changes







Land Use Alternatives

OPR clarified that avoidance and risk minimization can both be effective strategies and ensured that the TA did not give preference to either alternative.

Policy Development

OPR encourages local agencies to consider "no net loss" policies as complimentary to avoidance. In addition, the TA includes local planning approaches to support vegetation management.

Hazard Identification

OPR added additional language and examples to the TA, highlighting the impacts of wildfire smoke as well as other wildfire-related hazards.


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Purpose

CWPC reviewed planning tools across...

- 39 Tribal Nations
- 58 Counties
- 189 Local Responsibility Area (LRA) Jurisdictions

CWPC also developed a survey

- 600+ planning and wildfire practitioners were contacted
- 117 responses were received from across the state



Plan Alignment Guides



OPR is developing a suite of plan alignment guides to help local and regional agencies increase coordination to address wildfires and flood after fire events. The guides will...

- Outline local plans and their respective requirements
- Discuss strategies for aligning and leveraging planning processes
- Highlight relevant tools and guidance documents

The guides will be published in 2023 in both an interactive online format and print booklet format.



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Evacuation Planning TA



SB 99 (2019), AB 747 (2019), and AB 1409 (2021) – as codified in GC § 65302(g) and 65302.15 – require local governments to update their general plan safety elements to...

- Identify residential developments in hazard areas with less than two evacuation routes
- Assess evacuation routes and locations under a range of emergency scenarios

OPR will publish a draft Evacuation Planning TA for public comment by the end of 2022. The final TA will be available in 2023.



State Minimum Fire Safe Regulations




Recently the Board of Forestry & Fire Protection approved amendments to the Minimum Fire Safe Regulations to...

- establish standards for fuel breaks and greenbelts around communities
- Preserve undeveloped ridgelines designated as strategic

The amendments are currently being reviewed by the Office of Administrative Law with an anticipated effective date of January 1, 2023.



Land Use Planning for Wildfires in California – New Trainings
